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Edward Hopper

Edward Hopper, the master of American Solitude



Edward Hopper (1882-1967) stands as a seminal figure in American art, celebrated for his evocative and enigmatic depictions of solitude and urban isolation. Born in Nyack, New York, his artistic journey began with an interest in drawing and illustration, leading him to study at the New York School of Art. His early exposure to the works of American and European artists profoundly shaped his style, but it was his exploration of modern urban landscapes and psychological depth that truly defined his oeuvre.

Hopper's art is marked by its distinctive portrayal of American life, particularly the themes of isolation and existential contemplation. His most iconic works often depict solitary figures within stark, empty settings—urban scenes, rural landscapes, and interiors imbued with a palpable sense of stillness. 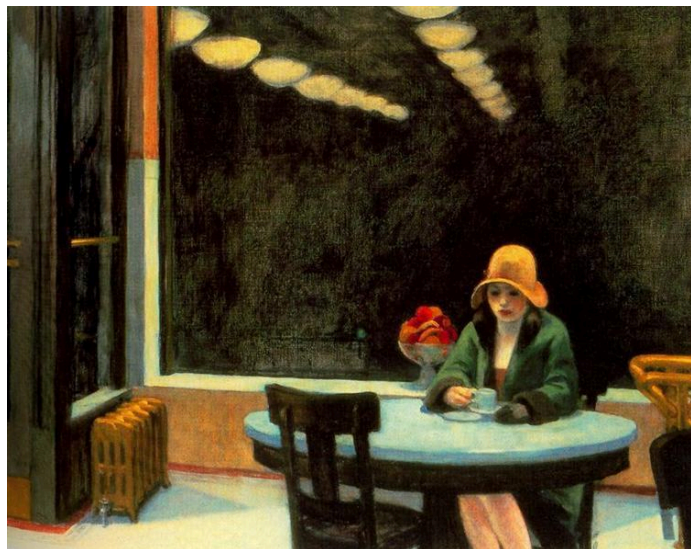
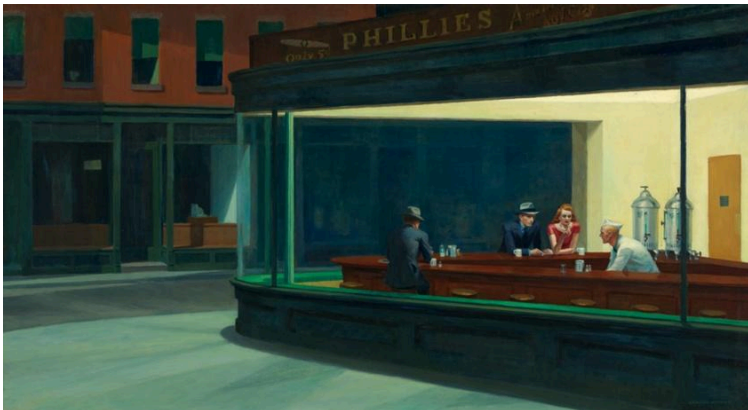
