| 10 | The kiss | Gustav Klimt | 1908-9 | A striking intimate image, a man and a woman locked in an embrace surrounded by luxurious colours and gold | The lines between luxury and decadence are blurred as are the barriers between love and lust |
| 9 | The persistence of memory | Salvador Dali | 1931 | Melting clocks on a desolate beach | Exploration of the cosmic order or Einstein's theory of relativity or the surrealist perception of a soft cheese melting beneath the sun's rays (Dali) |
| 8 | Girl with a pearl earring | Johannes Vermeer | 1665 | A portrait of a girl with a pearl earring. The earring is the picture's focal point. The girl's plain face is caught as though unprepared | Its provocative voyeurism has many viewers speculating on the subject's thoughts and her backstory |

| 7 | Olympia | Edouard Manet | 1863 | A naked woman lying on the bed looking at the viewer. On our right there is also a black woman with flowers and a black cat | Less innocent nude than its predecessors (Venus by Titian and Giorgione). The woman displays indicators of prostitution and a confrontational gaze that shocks the audience. She's a woman in control of herself |
| 6 | The birth of Venus | Sandro Botticelli | 1486 | A naked Venus emerges out of the sea standing on a large seashell. On our right a woman is covering her and on the left two figures of winds are blowing | The artist presents the beautiful goddess as an icon of neoplatonism, a movement attempting to connect Greek and Roman thought with Christianity. Venus is a concoction of classical influences that has made its way into modern culture on many occasions |

| 5 | The scream | Edvard Munch | 1893 | A ghostly figure on a bridge holding his/her head and screaming | It reflects the end of photorealistic technical efforts and the beginning of metaphoric emotional pieces. The pain, fear and horror that the figure feels are definitely felt. The subject looks trapped inside the painting and inside our world |
| 4 | Guernica | Pablo Picasso | 1937 | A grey, black and white abstract painting with many parts of creatures (animals and humans). It is a typically Picasso piece that shows devastation and destruction. It is intensely dramatic | The bombing of the Basque town Guernica and the ongoing Spanish Civil war inflicted by the emerging fascist powers of Germany and Italy. Some find Picasso's own ego in the disfigured creatures. Others note that the horse and bulls are important Spanish symbols while others see the rampaging rise of nazism |

| 3 | The last supper | Leonardo da Vinci | 1495-98 | Jesus and his disciples around the table. There is also a woman on his right. The artist captures the moment when Jesus tells his followers that one will betray him | It has inspired many conspiracy theories |
| 2 | The starry night | Vincent Van Gogh | 1889 | A landscape with swirling, circling clouds, moon and stars of the night sky over a village | An exaggerated but beautiful scene that the viewer can't help getting involved in |
| 1 | Mona Lisa | Leonardo da Vinci | 1503-17 | A small size portrait of a woman staring at the viewer with an enigmatic smile in front of a landscape | The subject of the painting is under debate. She is an object of extreme fascination because of her inescapable stare, her unreadable expression and her incredible detail |
