



# **Pointillism and Georges Seurat**

Pointillism is a special painting style that started at the end of the 19th century. It was invented by Georges Seurat, a French artist. Instead of using brushes, Seurat painted with small dots of color. When you look at the painting from far away, the dots mix together to create a beautiful image.



Seurat's most famous painting is *A Sunday Afternoon on the Island of La Grande Jatte*. In this painting, you can see people relaxing in a park by the water. The small dots of color make the scene look very bright and lively.

Pointillism is different from other styles because it shows how colors become one together. Seurat believed that this technique could bring more light in his paintings. His work is very important for modern art.

#### **Painter**

Georges-Pierre Seurat (1859 –1891) was a French post-Impressionist painter and draftsman. He is noted for his innovative use of drawing media and for devising the painting techniques known as chromoluminarism and pointillism. His large-scale work, A Sunday Afternoon on the Island of La Grande Jatte (1884–1886), altered the direction of modern art by initiating Neo-impressionism, and is one of the icons of late 19th-century painting.
