#### The poet

<u>Sylvia Plath</u> was an American poet, novelist, and short story writer. She is credited with advancing the genre of <u>confessional poetry</u> and is best known for <u>The Colossus and Other Poems</u> (1960), <u>Ariel</u> (1965), and <u>The Bell Jar</u>, a semi-autobiographical novel published shortly before her <u>suicide</u> in 1963.

#### The book

<u>The Bell Jar</u> is the only novel written by the American writer and poet <u>Sylvia Plath</u>. Originally published under the pseudonym "Victoria Lucas" in 1963, the novel is supposedly semi-autobiographical with the names of places and people changed. The book is often regarded as a <u>roman à clef</u> because the protagonist's descent into mental illness parallels Plath's experiences with what may have been <u>clinical depression</u> or <u>bipolar II disorder</u>. Plath died by suicide a month after its first United Kingdom publication.
